




What is a Heritage Conservation District?

HCDs can be important tools for managing change in areas containing heritage buildings and landscapes



HCD studies identify the cultural heritage value and heritage attributes of a recommended HCD boundary



A HCD is a place where history is embraced, and heritage resources have been preserved. Broadly speaking, HCDs allow municipalities to protect an entire area with heritage character. They use a heritage permit system for certain things like additions, new design, or major alterations to buildings to manage change over time. There are currently 147 HCDs in


Ontario, containing over 26,000

protected heritage properties.


In an HCD, the municipality passes a by-law that protects each property in the recommended boundary under Part V of the Ontario Heritage Act



Ultimately, in Ontario, the onus is on the community to decide how to protect and conserve their heritage

What is a Heritage Conservation District Plan?

- The Town of Whitby is undertaking a review of the Town's two HCD Plans
- A Heritage Conservation District Plan (HCD Plan) is a policy and guidance document that manages change within an HCD
- The purpose of the review is to continue to best conserve the cultural heritage resources within each district while also encouraging compatible redevelopment







Project Background

Brooklin HCD

- Designated in 2007 as the Town's first HCD
- Contains 185 properties
- A former rural village with a main commercial corridor and adjacent residential streets

Werden's HCD

- Designated in 2017, and amended by the Local Planning Appeal Tribunal in 2019
- Contains 250 properties
- Town's largest concentration of historic residences

Project Purpose

- Improve consistency between the Brooklin HCD (2007) and Werden's Plan Neighbourhood HCD (2017), where appropriate
- Bring the HCD Plans into conformity with recent legislative changes and current land use policies
- Create more user-friendly HCD Plans for the public and Town staff








Brooklin Heritage Conservation District

- The Heritage Character Statement and Character Defining Elements were prepared based on the district being a rare surviving example of a rural Ontario village
- The District is intended to conserve the heritage value identified in the Heritage Character Statement, including the sense of 'porosity' in the HCD streetscape so that buildings do not block views of natural elements





What Makes the District Special?

Brooklin's Heritage Character

- Largely intact village commercial main street surrounded by residential streets
- Uniquely shaped lots influenced by the diagonal alignment of Baldwin Street
- Low-rise buildings (1 to 2 ½ storeys)
- Landmark buildings (e.g. the mill, the Royal Canadian Legion building)
- Mix of wood frame and red brick construction
- Views between buildings of Lynde Creek and its vegetation
- Parks and green space (Grass Park, Brooklin Kinsmen Park)
- Building stock from all stages of the village's evolution starting from the mid-19th century
- Balance of buildings and landscape elements







Brooklin Heritage Conservation District

Current District Objectives

Heritage Buildings

 Retain and conserve heritage buildings and features over relocation or demolition

New Development

- Encourage development that is complementary to the HCD
- Provide for a mix of land uses
- Encourage adaptive re-use of existing building and redevelopment of lands

Community Support

- Share information on best conservation practices
- Support community events









Current District Objectives

Landscape/Streetscape

- Encourage the retention and enhancement of existing tree-lined streetscapes
- Preserve and reinforce existing views along streets of landscape features
- Ensure that municipal improvements in the HCD enhance the heritage character of the District

Economic Development

 Support revitalization of Brooklin's downtown core as a local service and regional specialty retail and tourism destination




Werden's Plan Neighbourhood Heritage Conservation District

- Contains historic and contemporary Town landmarks, including the Ontario County Courthouse and Registry Office, and the Whitby Public Library
- A Statement of the District's Cultural Heritage Value and Heritage Attributes were prepared based on the district containing the greatest number of historic residential streetscapes in Downtown Whitby







What Makes the District Special?

Werden's Heritage Character:

- Residential streetscapes with historic building stock and mature trees
- Single-detached low-rise residences built from the mid-19th century onwards
- Predominantly brick exteriors
- Five historic landmarks (St. Mark's United Church, King Street School, the Centennial Building, Registry Office, and St. Andrew's Church)
- Contemporary landmark of the Whitby Central Library
- Public open spaces including Celebration Square and Rotary Centennial Park
- Views along Centre Street South towards All Saints' Anglican Church







Werden's Plan Neighbourhood Heritage Conservation District

Current District Objectives

Land Use

- Align land use designations with the neighbourhood's existing character
- Maintain a low-density residential appearance
- Recognize the place and function of identified landmarks and prioritize adaptive reuses that have public benefits

Public Realm and Private Open Space

- Facilitate the safe crossing of pedestrians across major streets
- Support conditions suitable for the preservation of mature street trees
- Preserve and enhance public open space
- Maintain private open space in lawn, trees, and plants
- Minimize front yard parking and locate new driveways to side yards
- Discourage lot severance







Current District Objectives

Buildings

- Preserve the residential streetscapes
- Maintain the neighbourhood's six landmarks
- Encourage building maintenance and repair
- Encourage retention and restoration of original built elements
- Maintain the existing mix of single-detached house sizes
- Keep an ample amount of open space when new dwellings are constructed
- Limit the height of residential additions and new dwellings
- Locate accessory buildings in side or backyards
- Prefer red brick as the wall cladding material for a new dwelling
